Want answers on ForUm? Seven interesting facts and figures you should know.

1. What is ForUm?

"ForUm" stands for ForUm for Urban Futures in Southeast Asia. This is a networking of Southeast Asian and German experts for North-South-South dialogue focussing on urban challenges and conflicts — providing a platform for exchanges on concepts, researches, applications of urban issues and best practices. At least once a year, the urban experts from Germany and different Southeast Asian countries meet over an intense period of 10 days or so, to make scientific presentations from their respective countries and to discuss regional case studies and best practices. The meetings are normally enhanced by presentations from local experts, NGOs, private sectors, government bodies and city managers of the host countries. Relevant fieldwork excursions and interesting site visits complement each ForUm meeting to make it a rewarding and enriching experience.

2. What is the vision and goal of the ForUm?

- Vision: to intensify and integrate the interdisciplinary and intercultural "North-South-South dialogue" among urban experts from Southeast Asia and Germany, making contributions to the theory, models and good practices through multi-stakeholder approach involving scientists, urban administrators, private sectors, and the civil society.
- Goal: Unlike other seminars, this is an exchange platform involving about ten days of
 intensive interaction that enables future joint researches, publications, exchange
 excursions, seminars, newsletters, short- and long-term teaching exchanges, and thesis
 supervision, etc.

3. Who are the partner countries?

The countries are Cambodia, East Timor, Germany, Indonesia, Laos, Malaysia, Myanmar, Philippines, Thailand, and Vietnam. So far, more than 200 individuals from various universities, government sectors, NGOs, the private sectors and international cooperation agencies are in the network and have participated in the ForUms.

4. When and where was the first ForUm meeting held?

The first meeting started as a German-Southeast Asian "Summer School" in October 2005 at the University of Cologne, Cologne, Germany. At the end of 2009, the appellation was changed from "Summer School" to "Urban Experts ForUm" as this was more appropriately a meeting of practitioners, academicians and experts in the urban field.

5. How many ForUm meetings have been held so far and who organises them?

Nineteen (19) ForUm meetings have been held so far from 2005 to 2017 (January). Except for 2013, 2014 and 2016, ForUm meetings have been held at least once every year. Generally, the academic institutions of ForUm members in the respective countries (often, government bodies and sometimes, the private sectors, are also involved) are responsible for the preparations of the programmes, accommodation, field trips, etc. The social fraternity of the ForUm is informally organised by a small group of "chronologically senior" members (who call themselves the "Club 50s"). For the records, sincere appreciation goes to all host countries, which have organised previous ForUm meetings with deep commitment, enthusiasm and with wonderful successes.

7. Who sponsors the ForUm meetings; who provides the leadership; and what have been the achievements of the ForUm network?

ForUm expresses its gratitude for the generous sponsorship of Deutscher Akademischer Austauschdienst (DAAD) or German Academic Exchange Service, without which the ForUm series would not have been possible. The Institute of Geography, University of Cologne provides the leadership and guidance under the very able mentorship of Professor Dr Frauke Kraas (Teaching and research interests on Megacities, Urban and Social Geography, Governance, Heritage, Health, Risks, Migration, Southeast Asia (Myanmar, Thailand, Indonesia, India, and China). The achievements of ForUm are innumerable and (sometimes) immeasurable and they have been documented explicitly in the previous 16 newsletters as well as in the current issue. Irrefutably, ForUm has established a strong international, interdisciplinary and multi-stakeholder exchange platform which has enabled joint research projects, joint research papers and books (academic anthologies), numerous bi-/multinational staff qualification and teaching exchanges (short-term and long-term stays), joint international research evaluations, PhD/Master supervisions, supervision of international internships and many bilateral student excursions, to name some.

(Note from the Editor: It is most appropriate at this juncture for us, the participants of ForUm, to express our deep gratitude to Prof Frauke Kraas for her commitment and leadership to ForUm. Any sponsored event, without a good and dedicated leader, would be just another "one of those normal events". But ForUm is different and unique. Its sustained existence has spawned a new generation of Southeast Asian urban researchers simply because Prof. Kraas has a heart for the "locals" – a heart that is born out of genuine, sincere, and unselfish motivations. A precious and irreplaceable German-Southeast Asian connection has emerged because she chose to sacrificially relate, nurture and encourage each individual participant).



Best Head of study programme...



Dr. Rini was appointed as the Head of the Regional Development Study Programme, Faculty of Geography, Universitas Gadjah Mada in 2011. During her tenure as Head until 2015, Dr. Rini managed to internationalise the programme through fieldwork collaboration with universities in Malaysia, Singapore and Thailand. For this, Dr. Rini, In 2013, received an award from the University Rector as the "Best Head of Study Programme". Again, in 2016 she received an award from the Regional Development and Planning Specialty Group of the American Association of Geographers in recognition for her outstanding leadership in organising the 13th Asian Urbanisation Conference held in January 2016. *Dr. Rini described her career as having "started and grew with ForUm" because the Summer School in 2005 in Cologne was her first*

exposure to global interaction. Currently, she has active collaboration with Utrecht University (Netherland), University of Minho (Portugal), Nanjing University (China) and the University of Bourgogne (France).

Appointed as Dean of Faculty...

Dr Ta Quynh Hoa was promoted to be the Director of the International Cooperation Centre for Education and Consultancy (ICCEC) in her university in Hanoi, the National University of Civil Engineering (NUCE) in November 2015. And in the following year, June 2016, she was appointed as the Dean of International Education Faculty. Besides her busy lecturing position as the Senior Lecturer in the Faculty of Architecture and Planning in NUCE, she is also responsible for organising and facilitating all the international joint programmes at both the undergraduate and postgraduate levels with countries such as Malaysia,

Indonesia, and Singapore. In addition, she also facilitates collaboration with other domestic higher institutions like National Economics University and Vietnam Institute of Urban and Rural Planning. It is clear that the networking established in ForUm has given the University authorities confidence in her ability to take on the new role.

Secured the prestigious Georg Forster Fellowship...



Dr. Zin Nwe was deservingly promoted to Associate Professor at the Department of Geography, University of Yangon in August 2015. Equally more newsworthy is the fact that in April 2016 she applied for and successfully secured the highly prestigious Georg Forster Research Fellowship funded by the Alexander von Humboldt Foundation, with a research proposal on heritage conservation and tourism of Mrauk-U. Her application was among the few successful ones from hundreds of applications from developing countries. That's an excellent achievement. *Dr Zin Nwe partially attributes her success to the experience and learning curves from ForUm participation: "members giving suggestions and sharing their knowledge. I learned a lot in every ForUm meeting, especially from the more senior ones". In a wider context, Dr. Zin Nwe adds that the expert network group*


in ForUm are not only experts in urban matters, but also experts in sharing, caring, encouraging and fun to be with".

In 2012 Dr. Monsicha Bejrananda moved from King Mongkut's Institute of Technology Ladkrabang (KMITL) to Khon Kaen University and was immediately appointed as the Dean of Faculty of Architecture. And because of a DAAD scholarship to Cologne in 2009 and her active ForUm participation, she was able to establish in 2013 a MOU between University of Cologne and Khon Kaen University. Since then, several academic exchanges have taken place. She added: "ForUm has connected my Faculty not only with University of Cologne but also with colleagues from other universities in Southeast Asia...". This RETA project covers a very extensive region from Bandung and Makassar in Indonesia to Suva in Fiji, Tbilisi in Georgia, Ulaanbaatar in Mongolia and Mandalay in Myanmar. After 34 years in the University of Malaya, teaching and doing research related to Urbanisation, Urban and Settlement Geography, Prof. Lee left to join a private University to serve initially as the Director of Academic Quality in Nilai University. In 2013 he was appointed to one of the University's top management positions as the Deputy Vice-Chancellor, in charge of academic affairs and post-graduate studies. He is now retired, though still active in research collaboration. Departure for home

Brief report (edited from the account by Dr. Boy. Indeed, without his write-up nobody would have been able to remember such details after almost one and half years! Thanks Boy).

After a 6-hour high-spirited bus ride from Yangon, the ForUm members checked into Thingaha Hotel in Nay Pyi Taw, to rest before the opening ceremony the next day on 7th September. The Opening Ceremony started with a Welcome Address by the Minister of Construction of the Republic of Myanmar, followed by a warm response from Prof. Dr. Frauke Kraas. The rest of the day was devoted to 8 scientific presentations by ForUm members from different countries (see programme). After the morning session of scientific presentations on 8th Sept., the members had a welcome break with an excursion in Nay Pyi Taw and its surrounding townships of Zabu Thiri, Dhekina Thiri, Pobba Thiri, Pyinmana Thiri and Leway Thiri including a visit to the Parliament compound, an organic farm, the Wunna Theikdi Stadium and the Dhatuceya Dhat Paung Su Pagoda. NPT is the new administrative capital of Myanmar with a population of about 200,000 people. Dinner was hosted by the Director of the Department of Building, Ministry of Construction of Myanmar at the YKKO Restaurant. The morning of 9th September was back to formal scientific presentations followed by workshop discussions in the afternoon. Dinner was at the Western Park Restaurant hosted by the Department of Urban and Housing Development.

On 10th September, the group embarked on a 4-hour bus trip to Mandalay in Central Myanmar via Sagaing, stopping for a delicious traditional Myanmar lunch. Entering the Mandalay-Amarapura territory, the group visited the renowned 1,208-meter long U Bein Bridge made from teak woods located at the Taungthaman Lake. Later, we checked into the Noble Mingalar Hotel in Mandalay. A

whole-day session on September 11, held at the University of Mandalay, discussed more scientific papers. An important outcome of the discussion so far was clarifying the concept of urban systems (i.e., the connectivity between hierarchies of cities) vis-à-vis urban structures and urban processes. After a full morning session the following day, the group had an afternoon excursion to several local industries and handicrafts centres including visits to outstanding landmarks in Mandalay such as the Mandalay Palace Complex, the Shwe Nandaw Kyaung Monastery, the Kuthodaw Pagoda and the acclaimed Mandalay Hill (230 m above sea level) to take in a magnificent panoramic view of the Mandalay sunset.

September 13 was the final day and the finishing session of the Urban ForUm seminar in Myanmar was devoted to a plenary discussion on "The roles of various stakeholders in bringing about urban systems development" which elicited a good exchange of views and impressions. Our farewell dinner was held at the Daung Lann Gyi Restaurant serving sumptuous traditional Myanmar dishes and which ended with an impromptu social party with singing and traditional dancing.

Outcome of the scientific meetings:

- It is necessary to view the urban system as the relationship between hierarchies of cities. In this connectivity, each country needs to first of all, identify the hierarchy that most affects the urban system; and then to prioritise the hierarchies for policy intervention.
- SEAsian cities are highly macrocephalic will the development of other urban centres (whether secondary, tertiary or even border towns) be important?
- Planning for urban systems varies between countries; nonetheless, it is important that planning
 be inclusive for all sectors of the society taking into consideration social equity, social justice,
 civil society participation, quality of life, people-oriented approach, impact of climate change in
 urban areas, etc.
- The ASEAN community has to decide what they really need for themselves as far as foreign consultancy is concerned what to do with "foreign experts" who have insufficient local knowledge, culturally sensitive urban design, Idealistic master plan, how to handle foreign expert advice, the kind of foreign expertise needed, and how to manage decision-making processes to ensure that the decisions and outcomes will be relevant and useful for development.



Wednesday 25 Jan 2017

Departure from Khon Kaen City.

Brief report

The duration of the Khon Kaen ForUm was unusually shorter than previous ForUms – instead of 10-12 days, only 7 days comprising 2 travelling days, 4 days of intensive scientific presentations and discussions on "Urban Systems", and a one-day excursion. The 21 delegates from Germany, Indonesia, Malaysia, Myanmar, Philippines, Thailand and Vietnam were warmly welcomed by the Vice-Rector of Khon Kaen University which was followed by a response from Prof. Kraas.

The following is (slightly edited) Dr Mercado (BoyM)'s detailed account of the full day excursion on January 23, 2017 (Thanks BoyM):

Day 3 of this seminar was a full day fieldtrip. Field trips have always been an essential and traditional part of the Urban ForUm seminars – to get out of the classroom and to see what goes on "out there" in actual life. One could therefore imagine the participants' eagerness to be "in the field" and see the "sights". The "sights" included: 1) seeing a low-income housing and community development programme in Chum Phae Province; 2) a meeting with the Mayor of the Municipality of Khon Kaen at his office; and 3) a meeting with the Khon Kaen City Development Co. Ltd., and private business leaders at the Chamber of Commerce Office in Khon Kaen.

At about 8:30 am, we left our hotel riding in three vans westwards towards the Province of Chum Phae, the first leg of the fieldtrip. The weather was sunny but cool and breezy, just perfectly pleasant for a fieldtrip. More than an hour later, we arrived at the low-income housing and community development programme site.

Community development in action:

To welcome us were the community leaders and several government officers. We saw, on display, some handicraft and farm goods produced by the community members. A woman leader

gave us a briefing on the community development programme they had embarked upon. They described their story, its history, their aims, strategies, experiences, struggles, accomplishments and future plans.

From this community, we learned . . .

- 1. How this community of some 1,052 low-income families had struggled with poverty problems (low and insecure incomes, illegal housing, unsanitary housing conditions with serious waste disposal problems, and little community spirit, etc.)
- 2. How, by discussing their problems, the community began to take positive steps to deal with their problems with the help of the municipal government.
- 3. Their main aims are: To obtain decent sources of livelihood and housing; to nurture and foster a caring-helping-one-another community; to own and control their destiny as a community through the values of a sense of belonging; to practise regular savings from their income; to participate in planning for community development; to establish community infrastructures and economic projects; and to collect information and sharing knowledge for the common good.
- 4. The community's organisation and management structure is well established with clear-cut objectives, roles, tasks, projects and labour assignments.



5. They highlighted four main socio-economic ongoing projects: a) acquisition of house lots for housing, b) a Community Fund which had reached Baht 3.6 m from the members' savings, and from which they could avail of loans for livelihood, farming, etc., c) a community farm of

about 3 hectares to grow organic rice and other crops, d) a potable bottled water project.

6. The community and the municipal government have been partners in community development, with the government readily assisting the community for their various social, economic, technical, management and financial needs.

This was indeed a captivating and inspiring story of low-income families struggling and developing together for a decent and wholesome life. After the briefing, the group was taken to see the various projects: the housing project, the potable bottled water facility and the farming area. We concluded this visit with a sumptuous lunch from our kind and generous hosts.

A Visit to the Mayor's Office:



After lunch, the group travelled back to Khon Kaen and stopped by the Municipal Mayor's Office. The Mayor himself and some of his staff welcomed us at the briefing room. There he presented his government's vision and the local government's development agenda for the City.

Among the interesting points of his presentation are the visions of a "Happy Society" with "nobody left behind", and an all-inclusive development for the City of Khon Kaen. The Mayor would promote "people participation" to get the citizenry involved in the development process. He cited some of his programmes to respond to the issue of poverty, such as a feeding programme for some 2,000

"poorest of the poor" in the City, and also helping them with housing needs and education for their children. An assistance programme for the handicaps was also established. The Mayor was tapping and partnering with charitable institutions, restaurants and schools to help in the programmes.

The Mayor mentioned that, because of the unusual development and assistance programmes, his governance has been "at odds" with the central government. His city had been considered as a "maverick" city. However, he is adamant in pursuing his development agenda for the good of the people and society of Khon Kaen.

A Visit with the business leaders:

This last leg of the fieldtrip, a visit at the Chamber of Commerce' Office, provided an opportunity for our Urban ForUm group to meet some of the influential leaders, certainly a "driving force" of urbanisation in Khon Kaen City – the business sector.







The businessmen leaders of the city explained how the business sector would play a significant and crucial role in the city's development. The opportunities, they pointed out, were phenomenal and the proactive business leaders would not want to miss out on them. They accepted this role as the business sector's "social responsibility", other than the economic benefits that various businesses could reap out of playing a major part of the city's development. In particular, the business leaders were looking at the transportation system as among the most important aspects of where they could play the big game. Khon Kaen is expected to have a mass rail transit because of the input of these businessmen.


